2. Strategic Plan



Just as a map guides people from one location to their destination, a strategic plan that is rooted in action guides an organization through achieving its goals and, ultimately, fulfilling its strategic vision.

Survey results have shown us that clubs that develop and follow a strategic plan are **stronger** than clubs that don't because they have **more satisfied** members who view their clubs and Rotary more **positively** overall.

Presidents-Nominee are encouraged, but their attendance is optional. The curriculum for the President-Elect is different from that designed for the President Nominee. Attendance at PETS by a President Nominee, does NOT satisfy the attendance requirement when later a President-Elect.

2. Understand your club finances and prepare budget



Club Presidents & Officers should be knowledgeable about club financial practices and ask questions when clarification is needed.

District team is here to help each club remain strong financially and answer any questions regarding budgeting and planning for a strong position to allow clubs to accomplish their goals and remain a strong community partner.

3. Build a Strong Succession Plan





- Have a joint meeting with your current leadership team and incoming leadership team
- Keep the President, President Elect and President Nominee in the loop
- Ensure continuity in leadership at every level
- Collaborate with area clubs and utilize your Assistant Governor
- Learn of the skills, ambitions or potential of members through offering development opportunity
- Make it mandatory to form a committee of at least two members

4. Attend Club Officers training - 4/23



- While the Club President sets the direction for the club, the Club Officers carry out the work. But where do you go to find out just what you should be doing?
- Attend the Club Officers training on April 23rd, 2022
- Zoom sessions for each Club Committee to meet with the District team
 - Collaborate
 - Share information
 - Ask questions



5. Leverage Communication Channels

Effective teamwork begins and ends with communication. It is important for District and Club leaders to keep the communication open, effective, collaborative and respectful. District and Club leaders are empowered to exchange ideas, ask questions, and contribute using appropriate channels.



In Person - One on one engaging dialogues



Email/PMail (DACdb) - Provide directional, important and timely information



WhatsApp - Encourage collaborative dialogue and information sharing between District and Club leaders



Zoom - For weekly, monthly or quarterly District wide meetings
